COURSE DESCRIPTION: REIMAGINING YOUTH MINISTRY

This course explores the historical and contemporary dimensions and challenges of ministry to people in middle school and high school (6th-12th grade). The first part of the course examines the principles, foundations and history of youth ministry and *Pastoral Juvenil Hispana* with adolescents. The second part of the course addresses the developmental needs of young people and studies their diverse cultural realities in contemporary society. The last section of the course offers practical applications for developing effective ministry and outreach strategies and investigates models of accompaniment of young people—whether active, unchurched or disaffiliated—as they explore their faith and beliefs.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Familiarity with ministerial practices in various manifestations of church life, expressed in concrete pastoral applications which include discernment, compassion, and ministries of accompaniment.

Awareness of and critical engagement with how one's own culture influences ministry, and then to engage in ministries that build the community of Christ and are sensitive to and respectful of all cultures and traditions, and individuals who vary by race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and dynamics of wealth, poverty, and power.

Course Work:

1. **Informed and Engaged Class Participation (20 points):** Attendance is expected at all face-to-face and online classes. Thoughtful and reflective participation is expected, including sharing comments and questions throughout the course and via Camino, our online class platform. For each class session, you will be awarded up to 2 points: 1 point for attendance in class and 1 point for participating in the online discussion. To earn full credit for each class, participation in class and in the online discussion forum is required.

- 2. **Written Work:** Written work will be evaluated on quality of content, organization, clarity of expression, grammatical correctness, and appropriate citations.
 - a. Reflection paper: Due by Friday, October 20, 2023. (4-5 pages; double-spaced, 12 pt. font; submit via Camino). The purpose of this paper is to articulate and integrate insights from your reading and our class discussion specifically around innovative ways to minister to young people in a culturally diverse and more secular setting. Prominent question for reflection: How does ministry to young people need to change in light of realities of young people today? Considering the immense growth of the Latinx Catholic community, how do we shift traditional anglo-centric youth ministry to reach out to Latinx youth? Other questions for your consideration will be posed in class sessions. Be sure to reference and quote assigned readings up to this point in the class in the reflection paper to show knowledge and understanding of the subject matter.
- 3. **Final Project and Class Presentation:** (15 min.) Each student will select a topic of particular interest or concern regarding youth ministry in their existing ministry. In consultation with the instructor, the student will develop a specific project: for example, it might be a redesign of an existing youth ministry program, an intentional plan to reach the "Nones," ministering to Latinx youth, etc. There is a lot of room for creativity on this project. The key is that this project be something that you can implement in your ministry. I am not interested in a purely theoretical project, but one that is practical and realistic. On the day of our last Saturday session, students will give a brief (15 minute) presentation on the project. A written report is required that documents the scope and development of the project (8-10 pages). PowerPoint presentations and other media tools are required and should be submitted along with the paper. Guidelines will be presented in class.

GRADING

- 20% attendance/informed & engaged class participation (20 points total);
- 30% reflection paper (30 points total);
- 50% final paper/project/presentation (50 points total).
